The White Coat Ceremony is a meaningful tradition that signifies a student's transition into the clinical years of the pharmacy program. During the ceremony, students enrolled in the first year of the program are donned a white coat, a recognized symbol of clinical service and patient care. Students also recite the Pledge of Professionalism to publicly acknowledge their willingness to meet the professional expectations established by the pharmacy community.

The White Coat Ceremony, as it is known today, first began at the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons and has been adopted by numerous colleges

Ronald Ragan, RPh, PhD Dean and Professor The University of Kansas School of Pharmacy

Dr. Ronald Ragan received his B.S. in Pharmacy from the University of Kansas in 1984 and is currently licensed to practice pharmacy in both Kansas and North Carolina. He served as the Pharmacist-in-charge and manager of a professional community pharmacy for five years and a staff pharmacist in a hospital pharmacy for two years prior to his return to graduate school. He earned his M.S. (1997) and his Ph.D. (1998) in Pharmacology and Toxicology from the University of Kansas where his graduate studies focused on signaling in the brain and changes that occur with aging. In 1998 he accepted his first academic appointment as a Clinical Assistant Professor and

Director of the Non-Traditional PharmD (NTPD) Program at The University of Kansas where he oversaw the design and development of the new academic program. In 2004 he was promoted to Associate Dean for Academic Affairs in the School of Pharmacy where he was responsible for assessment and the professional curriculum. Dr. Ragan has published on topics related to neuronal cell death, drug therapy and pharmacy education.

In 2012 Dr. Ragan accepted the position of Professor and Founding Dean of the School of Pharmacy at High Point University. He led the design and development of the new Fred Wilson School of Pharmacy, including recruitment of the leadership team and first year faculty, SACS and ACPE accreditation, and helped design the new pharmacy teaching and research facility. In 2019 he was recruited back to The University of Kansas as Professor and Dean of the historic KU School of Pharmacy. Dr. Ragan is currently responsible for both the educational and research components of the enterprise.

Dr. Ragan is currently a member of the Kansas Pharmacists Association, the American Pharmacists Association, The American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy, The American Society of Health System Pharmacists, The American Association for the Advancement of Science, and The Society for Neuroscience. He has served on the board of directors of numerous health-related non-profit organizations and volunteers in his community through his work with civic organizations.

Dr. Ragan is married to Becky, also a pharmacist, and they are the proud parents of two adult sons, Sean and Scott.
